# City of Stewart Council Special Meeting Minutes June 25, 2025

### 1. Land use

- a. Property 1: 200670160, Property 2: 200670170, Property 3: 200670150
  - i. North Street property
  - ii. The estimated market value of the land is \$6,000 per parcel, totaling \$18,000 for the lot
  - iii. The property fell into disrepair, and the owners turned it over to the City of Stewart
  - iv. Mayor Peirce believes it took upwards of \$30,000 to clean up this lot
  - v. The current use for this land is a community garden for the Girl Scouts
  - vi. The dimensions are 150' long by 150' wide
  - vii. There are 2 water connections on this land which could split it up into two lots that are 75' x 150'
  - viii. It is zone residential, so someone would be able to build a house here
  - ix. The council has decided that if someone were to approach the city showing interest in purchasing, the City would be interested in possibly taking offers and moving forward with selling
- b. Property 4: 200310600
  - i. This land is located on both sides of the former Hughes-Hantge Funeral Home, north of Powers Street
  - ii. The value on this land is \$30,700
  - iii. It has 150,333 square feet
  - iv. There are some abandoned wells on the Northeast side of the property that the City had capped
  - v. The clerk will look into any conflicts with the RS Fiber pedestal on the portion of the lot that Curt Wangen is interested in buying
  - vi. The rest of the lot with the tree farm and the disc golf course, the City is not interested in selling at this time
- c. Property 5: 200501320, Property 6: 200501310
  - i. This property is next to the former Red Owl Agency South on Powers Street
  - ii. The lot is 52' wide by 150' long
  - iii. The estimated market value of Property 5 (17'x150') is \$1,000 and Property 6 (35' x 150') is \$2,000

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- iv. There is no water or sewer stubbed out to either of the parcels on this lot
- v. There are deferred Street assessments on this property
- vi. The council is interested in selling this land, but a policy needs to be put in place on how to disperse of City assets
- d. Property 7: 200670091
  - i. This property is located directly North and South of Mill Street
  - ii. The estimated market value of the property is \$89,700
  - iii. It is 9.9 acres
  - iv. There are plans to stub out at least 3 lots off of North Street for water and sewer that are part of this land
- e. Property 8: 200670093
  - i. This property is located South of Mill Street
  - ii. It is 22.3 acres
  - iii. Its estimated market value is \$150,700
  - iv. This property is currently being rented as farm land
  - v. There are 2 parties interested in renting for farm use, and one party interested in purchasing this and Property 7 at \$9,000 per acre (totally about \$280,000)
  - vi. There is one party interested in both Property 7 and 8 for a solar garden
  - vii. The only way to build on the west side of the land is if it was filled, due to it being much lower
  - viii. The Council has decided there is no interest in the solar garden
    - ix. They will take some time to think and research to determine if they want to move forward with selling or continuing to rent Properties 7 and 8

### 2. Buffalo Lake Ambulance

- a. Please see email for 2023 and 2024 Buffalo Lake audit if you need a copy, please let City Clerk know
- b. There are concerns about the request for funds for the Buffalo Lake ambulance
- c. The clerk was informed that they are behind multiple years on billing, and they have not been charging for services
- d. Buffalo Lake is requesting Stewart pay \$20,000 to help cover overnight wages
- e. The council is leaning toward not paying money to the ambulance since they are supposed to be getting revenue

### 3. Asset List

- a. Budget plans for Capital Assets
  - i. Historically, half of the LGA money was set aside for capital assets every year this has not happened in quite a few years
  - ii. Mayor Peirce has asked the Water/Wastewater Superintendent and Maintenance Supervisor to go through the asset list and figure out how long until each piece of equipment needs to be replaced

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iii. Mayor Peirce recommends that the LGA money we are now getting back from the 2022 audit goes into our capital investment fund, and going forward each department should be designated a certain amount for their capital funds
